## Math Fluency Assessments



Designed to help students master math facts!



All students start on Level I.



Students practice at home.



Parents sign and return the level when their child is ready to be tested at school.



A parent, teacher, or older peer will meet one-on-one with the student and "quiz" him or her.



It is oral. Students should be be able to produce the answer in about one second.

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If students <u>truly</u> have the level mastered, they will be able to produce the answer in about one second (without using fingers).



Two formats are provided for quizzing:
Flashcards (visual)
Answer Keys (auditory)




When the child successfully passes the list, the next level is sent home.



Use the grids to keep track of each individual's progress!


I organize my tests in this crate. I have 26 hanging file folders - one for each level. Copies of the assessments go in each folder, along with the corresponding answer key
